



The Jerusalem Cross
Fear not for I am with you

The cross that we use in our publications is the artwork of Rudolph Koch (1878-1934), a German type designer who was a master of lettering, calligraphy, typography and illustration. Appearing in his book entitled *Christian Symbols*, the Jerusalem Cross is #107 of 158 plates reproduced. The artist's wish was for his art to be available for use by scholars, churches, designers, and artists.

I chose this cross as representative of the life of a Christian community: we are called to gather around Christ and, by the work of the Holy Spirit, to be transformed into the likeness of Christ. To me it is a powerful symbol of all that we are called to be as a Christian faith community. ---Lynn+

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING MINUTES: MAY 3, 2015

- I. **Lynn Hade** opened the meeting at 10:34 a.m.
- II. **Introduction of New Vestry Members:** **Karl New** explained that per the by-laws of the church, floor nominations for Vestry or Diocesan/Deanery Representative on the day of the election are not permitted. The Nominating Committee put forth to the Vestry four candidates to fill the four open slots on the Vestry; and one person nominated to fill one slot as Diocesan Delegate/Deanery Representative. A motion was made by **Karl New** to elect all vestry candidates by acclamation. The motion was seconded by **Bruce Nicholson**. The motion passed. The vote was not unanimous, but did pass by a large majority. Elected to the Vestry were: **Sherry Eichert, Beverly Harvey, Barbara LaRue, and Rob Kavash**. A motion was made by **Karl New** to elect our Diocesan Delegate/Deanery Representative candidate by acclamation. The motion was seconded by **Donna Bennett**. The motion passed. The vote was not unanimous, but did pass by a large majority. Elected as Diocesan Delegate/Deanery Representative was **Joanne Mills**.
- III. **Expression of Gratitude for Retiring Vestry Members:** Lynn Hade thanked the Vestry members that have completed their terms: Sharon Dippre, Stan Klotzbach, Rob Kavash (who was re-elected) Barbara Johnson (Diocesan Delegate and Deanery Representative) and Karl New (finishing his term as Rector's Warden.) Karl commented that it was an honor to serve as the rector's warden and that he is amazed by what we can do as a group.
- IV. **Minutes of the 2014 Annual Parish Meeting:** There were no corrections to the minutes. A motion to file the minutes with secretarial privilege was made by **Linda Nicholson** and seconded by **Barbara Johnson**. The motion passed unanimously.
- V. **Financial Report:** Accounting Warden **Rob Kavash** began by noting that last year the annual meeting focused on the Building the Advent of Tomorrow campaign. The response was tremendous. We are in good financial shape. The BAT response enabled us to form the budget including provisions for a full term rector. Rob highlighted the written report. Gerry Lattuca asked about the dramatic increase in our total assets. Rob explained that the restricted cash funds increased significantly last year. The BAT campaign brought in \$15,000.
- VI. **Lyn Werner** was announced as the rector's warden for the next year.
- VII. **Lynn Hade** answered questions submitted at the meeting by those in attendance. She periodically answered some of these during the remaining portion of the meeting.
- VIII. **Lynn Hade** asked those in attendance to attach their copied information from the church register to a large church timeline. The large timeline included details about the church's history. Lynn explained that before the church makes decisions about its future, it is important to learn the details of its past.
- IX. **Adjournment:** The meeting adjourned at 11:55 a.m. with a closing hymn.

Rector's Message

Looking Back, Looking Forward

Happy New Year! It seems odd to say that on the first of May, but it is at the annual meeting that we look at the year just past and begin to prepare for the coming year. This past year has been a year of organizing our common life and our 'stuff.' We have a new closet so that the narthex is less cluttered, and new paint and furnishings to brighten it up. Finishing the chapel windows by painting the interior and installing new latches is on our radar screen. Much needed exterior painting began last fall and will continue this spring and summer. But sprucing up our space has been only a part of the work of the past year.

Caring for the people of Advent has also been an area that has been the focus of time and energy.

- Caritas, our lay pastoral care ministry, has been meeting to discuss the pastoral needs of the parish and determine how to best use our resources to meet those needs.
- We continue to consider how to best meet the spiritual needs of our youngest members and this year began to plan a service that is more kid friendly for the 3rd Sunday of the month.
- Our vestry has been learning about trends in church attendance nationally and thinking about how to factor this information into planning for the life of Church of the Advent.

The coming year will hold more change.

- Our Outreach committee has undertaken a wonderful project in offering a summer day camp. Our hope is to provide an enjoyable experience of Christian community for our own kids at Advent, while inviting new friends to join us in the fun. Our time will be enhanced when we are joined by children from several other parishes in the diocese, including some children from Latino communities of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.
- As mentioned above, work on the chapel will continue.
- If there is sufficient support from the parish, I hope that in the fall we will be able to host occasional activities designed to meet the needs of those in the Hatboro area who count themselves among the "spiritual but not religious."

Speaking of Change

Change, change, change! "Change is the one constant in life," wrote one ancient philosopher. Part of being a church in the 21st century is to experience change. There may well be some changes that you don't like. In fact, there probably already are. But, maybe those very same changes are welcome changes to another person. Such is life in a community. Living together as unique humans is always a matter of give and take.

Part of my job as a leader is to, as best as I can, make sure the changes are intentional, made to address a specific need, and always well within the teachings and practices of the Episcopal Church. Because our own tradition is so broad, it may be that even practices that are 'normal' in other parishes will feel quite strange here. I pick and choose among those practices to select those that I feel will be most helpful to our life together as a parish. I hope that we can use the questions generated by the parish for this meeting to explain some of the changes that have, or have not, been made this past year.

Finally, this year **Chris Gilman** and **Linda McGuigan-Miller** finish their vestry terms. Please join me in thanking them for their years of service.

Average Sunday Attendance:

Part of looking back at the end of the year needs to include looking at numbers. While Rob Kavash has shared financial numbers, here are some other numbers that are also important to share.

Like most churches across the nation, our average Sunday attendance has consistently dropped over the past years. There are many, many reasons this is happening and understanding the trend is beyond the scope of this parish report.* At Advent, our ASA has dropped again, but not as drastically as it has in previous years.

Here are the statistics at Advent for the past 10 years.

ACCOUNTING WARDEN'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 12/31/2015

Overall 2015 was a year in which the Church of the Advent maintained its generally good financial health with total asset levels essentially unchanged from the prior year.

The period for the Transition, during which we were ably served by Lou as a part time interim rector, enabled us to build up our assets somewhat. Financially the Church of the Advent ended the Transition in 2014 and entered 2015 with Lynn as our new full time rector. As a result 2015 provided a clearer picture of what our financial outlook will be going forward. Our pledge income for the 2015 budget year was \$164,205 which was about \$9,200 less than what was ultimately pledged for 2014. By the end of 2015 an additional \$5,427 was received in pledges, which closed that shortfall with a total of \$169,632 in pledged giving. Combined with plate giving of \$9,076 and other revenue sources, the total operating income for 2015 was \$186,446 which was essentially the same as for 2014. Coupled with a small increase in expenditures, we realized a net operating loss of \$5,615 for 2015.

The operating loss is indicative of a trend of smaller but stabilizing levels of giving and ever increasing costs. Fortunately, due to the generosity of the parish members, this challenge was met by the Building the Advent of Tomorrow campaign which became fully implemented during the 2015 budget year. This fund enabled the Vestry to prepare and approve a budget that was balanced. Administratively the Building the Advent of Tomorrow funds are being held in reserve and will be transferred to the Operating account as needed to maintain the requisite levels for good cash flow to cover expenses. The Building the Advent of Tomorrow program is critical to our achieving a balanced budget with the level of spending that will help us in our transition into the next phase in the life and mission of the Church of the Advent.

We ended 2015 with total assets (excluding real estate) of \$412,619. This is a very slight decrease from December 2014 of \$987.

Operating Expense totaled \$192,061 divided as shown below. A new budget line item for Technology Infrastructure was initiated in 2015 and is under Office. This is for the purpose of maintaining and upgrading computers, phones, internet presence, etc. to improve our efficiency, communication capability, and visibility.

Building Improvement Fund

Restricted Cash

For the year our restricted accounts had a combined decrease of \$4,346 and both accounts ended the year with capital losses (unrealized). Restructuring of the CC Young Fund has enable us to benefit from a significantly greater annual distribution than was previously realized.

Chapel Ministry As Janet Gilman wrote in the Outreach report, the chapel ministry is on the radar screen for further outreach to the community. The Outreach committee has dedicated some of their outreach monies to continue to rehabilitation of that space so that it is a more inviting space for those in our community who consider themselves 'spiritual but not religious' have a safe space to grow their relationship with God.

This year, we have worked to make the times when the chapel is open more apparent by the purchase of an 'open' flag. This allows our volunteers to open and close that chapel at times that work better with their own personal schedules. The new sign issues an invitation to visit the chapel, and it is in both English and Spanish, indicating a welcome to those who do not read English as their first language. In the coming year we hope to get the window latches fixed so that windows can be opened in the summer. We also hope to add comfortable seating, and reading materials that visitors might find interesting and helpful as they come to spend time in our beautiful space.

To support this ministry, we are seeking the following help:

Would you be willing to take a turn at opening or closing the chapel? If so, let Lynn Hade or Barbara Johnson know.

Are you good at painting? The interior of the chapel windows need to be carefully painted in order to complete the work begun in 2013 to preserve the windows.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION

Church School The church school year began October 4th with a four-week series of lessons each focusing on a saint and the Christian quality they possessed. Children made Anglican prayer beads and began a mosaic welcome sign in Spanish.

In November, children collected personal items for the homeless in order to help Anthony Castagna with a personal outreach project, and on the first Sunday of Advent, children made Advent wreaths. Church school sang “Go Tell it on the Mountain” during the December 20th service.

Proceeds from the annual rummage sale (held April 23rd) as well as last year’s cookie sale, will go to outreach such as St. John’s Food Pantry or the garden club that supplies the pantry with produce.

Commencement will be held on Sunday, May 15th, during the 10AM service.

Adult Formation Here are some of the highlights of Adult Christian Formation activities for 2015-2016:

- In the fall, we examined the teachings of the gospels through NOOMA, a short series of films that explore our world through the perspective of Jesus. Narrated by Rob Bell, best-selling author and former pastor, we discussed our relationship with God and the faith He has in all of us.
- During Advent/Epiphany, we explored the familiar story of Christmas as told through the gospels, with art work by John August Swanson and commentary by leading Biblical scholars.
- During Lent, we offered Journey to Easter classes on five successive Sunday mornings and Tuesday evenings. We discussed topics that included our belief in God, the complex nature of Jesus, sin and salvation, the kingdom of heaven, and prayer, while enjoying a light soup luncheon.
- In the fall and spring, we engaged in Quiet Mornings, led by Reverend Mary McCullough, to contemplate the topics of “Nurturing God’s Presence” and “Blessings in the Struggles.” Participants enjoyed a light lunch together following each session.
- Each Wednesday, a Bible study follows the 10 am Eucharist.

Outreach The Church of the Advent continues to support many Outreach opportunities. We have given money to many different organizations including MANNA, Habitat for Humanity, ECS, St. James School and Cradles to Crayons. We have contributed money as well as food to St. John's food pantry.

October saw us participate in the annual CROP walk. We increased the number of Christmas food baskets that we donated to St. John's food pantry. Twenty five baskets were provided in December 2015. PASTORAL CARE

Caritas and Eucharistic Visitors Caritas is our pastoral care team comprised of those who have been trained as Caritas Ministers at the Church of the Advent. The purpose of the team is to participate in meeting the pastoral caregiving needs of the people of Advent.

This ministry involves maintaining periodic contact with parishioners in need, home and hospital visits when appropriate and intentional prayer for the needs and concerns of those to whom they minister. This team works closely with the Rector, so she can provide pastoral care in times of crisis, life transitions and periodically visit those who are unable to attend church due to health or mobility.

We presently have eight people serving on this team: **Maryann Cannon, Rob Kavash, Alan Kiel, Henrietta Kiel, Mary Longman, Judy Murphy, Teri O'Shea** and **Marilyn Zembower**.

Intersecting with this ministry of caring in a very significant way is the ministry of Eucharistic Visitors. Because we are a people deeply rooted in the sacraments, we take seriously making them available to those who can no longer gather with our faith community on Sundays. **Barbara Johnson, Alan Kiel and Lyn Werner** faithfully take communion monthly to those committed to their care. **Judy Murphy and Ken Longman** have recently joined this team.

PROPERTY

There has been a lot of activity around the church over the past year. Last summer, the exterior sign on Byberry Road – newly painted and refurbished – was hung and the chapel doors and sign posts were painted. The old organ console near the chapel was removed and a spacious storage closet was built in its place. A safe was installed to secure our Sunday offerings. There are also a few projects that are currently underway including the repair of a step to the parish hall from the Byberry road entrance and replacing a window that is ground level below the library. There is also the ongoing maintenance of keeping our space well lighted and clean, both inside and out.
