I'm Glad You Asked: How are we doing at caring for each other?

This important question sheds light on two aspects of Christian community that have informed the life of the Church from the beginning. So, yes, I am not only glad you asked, I am delighted you asked!

The first thing to remember is that soon after the death of Jesus, followers of Jesus began to form small groups in order to think about the life they had shared with Jesus, his teachings and how best to honor the gift they had been given by virtue of their friendship with him. This all happened before there was, technically, a church. The first followers of Jesus were called "People of the Way" because their purpose was to figure out how to live out the Way, or teachings, of Jesus.

The communities gathered in very diverse settings—some were urban, some rural, some Jewish and some Gentile. Because of the different life styles of each community, a diversity of practices grew up, but all were tied together by the belief that in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, God was up to something new in the universe. Another belief that they held in common was that by gathering and forming a learning and worshiping community, the ability of each individual to follow the Way of Jesus was supported and strengthened.

The early Christians took their life together very seriously and saw it as the foundation upon which their own faith was built, and their witness to the world was strengthened. Christian faith has never been understood to be a solitary affair, but always a communal endeavor.

In the life of the Church we live out this understanding in two basic ways. The first is by emphasizing the importance of spending time together. The second is by including those who, because of their individual life circumstances are not able to gather with the group, in the life of the parish in other concrete ways. We practice the second as communion is brought to the homebound, flowers delivered to those we remember due to events in their lives and the weekly *HomeTouch* mailing to our homebound members. Sometimes we join together to provide rides to church for those who are no longer driving.

The first way I mentioned, spending time together, sometimes isn't thought of a way of 'caring for each other,' And yet, to give up some personal time to be with your fellow travelers in faith is a gift you can give to them, and a gift to receive from them. This is a form of caring for each other that your vestry has decided to focus on in the coming year. A primary goal is to find times to be together simply enjoying each other's company. So far, there are 3 fall events planned, and 2 more on the list for the spring. Faith isn't meant to be done alone: the Church has known that from the beginning. If we are to be a vibrant parish, spending time together beyond Sunday worship is critical to that goal.


Life Together!

Rodney Newman


Begins on Sunday, September 25th @ 11:45 a.m. or Tuesday, September 27th @ 6:00 p.m.

This 6 week reading and discussion program takes a look at the unique features of Celtic Christianity and how we can, in modern times, draw spiritual riches from this ancient tradition.

Based on the book authored by Rodney Newman, each session will be offered twice, on Sunday at 11:45 am and Tuesday at 6:00 pm. The six Sunday dates are 9/25, 10/2, 10/9, 10/16, 10/23, 10/30. The six Tuesday dates are 9/27, 10/4, 10/11, 10/18, 10/25, and 11/1. A simple meal will be served.

Please sign up on the bulletin board outside Lynn's office so we know how many to plan for. A contribution of \$10 is suggested to cover the cost of the book "Journeys with Celtic Christians". This is also open to anyone whom you think might have an interest.

"The early Christians of Ireland developed an expression of the faith characterized by deep devotion and fascinating stories," Newman says. "It offers rich insights for modern issues such as promoting a caring society, relating to the natural world and welcoming strangers."



Help Needed at St. John's Food Pantry

The Food Pantry continues to grow both in use and in what we are able to offer. A new record was set for the week of August 9-11 with 80 clients being served. Our current registration figures show that the average family size is greater than 3 so really about 250 people received help that week.

As a participant in the Rolling Harvest produce distribution, we have been receiving peppers, squash, tomatoes, onions, and greens. As a participant in the Bucks County Opportunity Council meat distribution, we have been able to offer numerous styles of sausages, bacon, ham, chicken and turkey breasts.

Currently, there is a great need for **drivers**. We have a cadre of volunteers who keep the pantry supplied with a variety of products. Opportunities to serve are during daytime hours Monday through Friday.

We are in need of drivers to **pick up bread and pastry** at the **Wilson Senior Center** in Warminster. Volunteers who are part of this group serve **one day per week for a month**. There is usually a month's rest between dates of service. The driver needs to be available around **noon** until about 1PM.

Volunteer drivers are needed for **Monday pick up** at the **Wawa** on Easton Rd. near County Line Rd. This takes about an hour and half and may be done at **either 10AM or 2PM**. Product is packed in insulated bags and then placed in aluminum trays at the pantry.

We could also use some help in **picking up the produce** on **Tuesdays** and the **meat** on **Thursdays**. We have a driver on each day but they need help carrying things to the car. This is about a two hour process, leaving the church around **10:30AM** and returning around **12:30PM**.

The Food Pantry thanks all the donors who have been making contributions in any form- monetary, canned and packaged goods, fresh vegetables from the garden. It would not be able to be as successful as it is without your continued generous support.

GETTING READY FOR CHRISTMAS FOOD BASKETS The Outreach Committee will again be sponsoring Christmas food baskets for St. John's Lutheran Church's Food Pantry in Hatboro. Last year, we sponsored 20 families, but this year we will be sponsoring 30 families. The food collection will run from mid-October into December, and collection boxes will be on the stage in the parish hall. Before we can begin to collect, we need "Xerox (copy) paper boxes". If you have access to these at school or work, please bring them in on Sundays and leave them on the stage in the parish hall. The list of food donations includes gravy, stuffing mix, cranberry sauce, canned vegetables, potato mix, juice, coffee, tea, hot chocolate, sugar, flour, Christmas candy, napkins, and disposable roasting pans.
