Rector Reflections

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent.

BCP pg 265.

In the Anglican tradition of Christianity (that is our heritage as Episcopalians), a priest was referred to a curate and their role defined as "the cure of souls." It was the role of the local priest to tend to the soul needs of the parish and assist the community and individuals in recovering the wounds to the soul. Those wounds are understood to be everything from the tragic losses that can happen in individual lives, to events that affect the spirit of the whole town. It is out of that background that each Ash Wednesday the priest reads from our Book of Common Prayer, "I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent."

How to do that? How do we go about 'observing a holy Lent?' Sometimes we give up special treats during Lent—a practice of discipline that prepares us for greater sacrifices that following Jesus sometimes required. Sometimes we take up a special activity—a reminder that to take up the Way of Jesus is an intentional, conscious choice made in trust and hope in God. In the earliest days of the Church, in Lent adults considering the Christian Way devoted time to study and prayer. In those days, choosing Christianity was counter-cultural and risky. The Church wanted candidates for baptism to be sure about their choice before making a commitment to following Jesus.

When was the last time you took special time to consider your life as a Christian? Could it be that this year, Lent could be a time to do the holy work of deepening your understanding of the meaning of being Christian in the 21st century? May I invite you to keep a holy Lent this year?

Inside this issue of the Herald you will find many opportunities to deepen your understanding of Christianity and challenge your soul to growth and deepening. I hope that you will find something that will help you to keep a holy Lent this year.

Vestry Changes

According to Canon Law of the Episcopal Church, sound stewardship of the parish's property and resources is the key area of vestry responsibility. As the legal representatives and agents of a parish, the vestry functions much like the board of any nonprofit organization, with legal responsibility for finances and management of property and human resources and the oversight of the 'big picture' of mission. Traditionally, parishes the size of Advent have operated with a larger vestry whose members took on additional roles such as property management, financial record keeping and running the Church School.

For over a year the vestry has discussed if our vestry is right-sized for the current needs of our parish. With many volunteers stretched thin for time and energy, we wonder if our traditional size of 12 members is the best way for us to use the valuable time resources of our leaders.

Might it make more sense, we have wondered, to have a smaller vestry and use the time of parish leaders in more efficient ways? Do we need 12 people to attend vestry meetings monthly to carry out vestry responsibilities, when 9 would do? Might the time of those other 3 be better spent engaging or organizing the many volunteer-dependent ministries of the church?

Finally, with an assumption that it is the vestry's job to get things done around the parish, others are discouraged from taking leadership roles. For the success of our mission, the labor of many is needed.

Based on this discussion, the vestry has made the decision to reduce the size of the vestry to 9 members beginning with the 2017 vestry elections. A nominating committee has been formed and they hope to offer a slate of at least 5 candidates for the 2-3 positions that will be open. How many positions open will depend on how many of the 4 members at the end of their term elect to serve a second term.

The names and biographies of those nominated to vestry this year will be available no later than April 7th, both online in the 'members' section of our website and on posters in the narthex. Notices will also be included in Sunday bulletins.



KEEPING A HOLY LENT AT CHURCH OF THE ADVENT

Healthy Body Healthy Soul: Quiet prayer, often called contemplative prayer, is an ancient practice of the Church. It is not a prayer that is about talking to God. Rather, it is an offering of time and attention that is simply meant to make space in our hearts and lives for the presence of God. By quieting mind and body, the soul is freed to simply rest in God.

Our own Trish Troilo, a certified yoga instructor, is leading a weekly 30 minute group titled "Breathing Through Lent," designed to experience how our bodies can support us the practice of prayer.

Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time: is the book we will read this year during Lent. This book by *Marcus Borg* takes a look at what we know about the historical Jesus, and how that can enhance our 21st century Christian Faith. Books in our Narthex Library:

<u>Accidental Saints</u>, by Lutheran pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber, is a collection of funny, touching and sometimes raucous essays that talk about how other people intersect our lives in holy ways.

Between the World and Me, by journalist Ta-Nahisi Coates is a letter to his son about growing up male and black in the United States.

<u>Good Goats: Healing our Image of God</u> by Dennis, Sheila and Matthew Linn looks at how our image of God can be skewed by things we learned or happened to us in childhood, and offers transformative alternatives based on Christian teaching.

<u>Half Truths</u> by Methodist pastor Adam Hamilton is about phrases we hear (like 'God helps those who help themselves,' or 'God never gives us more than we can handle,') that we think are Biblical, but really aren't.

<u>Love Wins</u>, by Rob Bell, addresses one of the most controversial issues of faith—hell and the after-life—arguing, would a loving God send people to eternal torment forever?

<u>Plan B: Further Thoughts on Faith</u>, by Anne Lamott is a collection of essays about recovery from addiction, relationships and modern life that are often very funny, and always touch at the heart of faith.

<u>Take this Bread</u>, by Sara Miles follows the journey of a woman who grew up in a secular Jewish home, walked by an Episcopal church one Sunday and found God in the Eucharist. The community she found at St. Gregory's Episcopal Church in San Francisco inspired her to start a food bank that is a unique combination of food, fellowship and faith.

<u>Understanding Difficult Scripture in a Healing Way</u>, by Matthew, Sheila and Dennis Linn looks at some of the passage of the Bible that have been used harmfully and offers interpretations that come closer to their original meaning.

Something New at Church of the Advent

In the year 325 AD, the Roman Emperor Constantine declared Christianity the official religion of the Roman Empire. That made it possible for Christians to gather and worship more publicly and one of the ways they did that was to, on Good Friday, pilgrimage through the city of Jerusalem, visiting sites along the way that were significant to the last day of Jesus' life.

The annual event soon became a significant part of worship during Holy Week. As pilgrims from beyond Jerusalem visited to participate, they took back the news that the pilgrimage was significant to their prayer during Holy Week, and in churches and cathedrals all over the Roman Empire, the Way of the Cross, sometimes called "stations of the cross," was born.

During Lent this year, an updated version of Stations of the Cross will be available in our chapel. Using the traditional 14 stations, the Way of the Cross continues as we journey with Jesus who suffers today in the struggles of people in Africa, Asia and the Americas, whose lives are illustrated in photos and narrative.

The Stations will be open when the chapel is open and the flag is out, on **Tuesdays until 8 pm** and on **Good Friday from 11 am to 7 pm**.

The gentleman receiving the items expressed his profuse gratitude to the Church of the Advent. All will be used by the seafarers.

Food Pantry Volunteers: The food pantry could use drivers for **Tuesday** and **Wednesday** pick up at the Davisville Road Wawa. This can be done either around 10AM or 2PM at your convenience. It involves packing the product in the insulated bags that we provide, delivering it to the pantry and helping put it in the freezer.

Also needed is a volunteer to pick up product on **Fridays** from the Ben Wilson Senior Center in Warminster. This position involves picking up excess bread and pastry from the center, usually around noon time, and delivering it to St. John's. Since the pantry is not open on Fridays, the product gets placed in the freezer. Volunteers for this task are assigned a specific month and given at least one month or more of rest before their turn comes around again.
